Parish Lent Reading Groups

Wednesday evenings, 6-7pm on *Zoom, 1st to 28th March weekly Dust and Glory: A Lent journey of faith, failure and forgiveness

This is the Church of England's Lent theme for 2023. This year's resources are informed and inspired by the Archbishop of Canterbury's 2023 Lent Book, Failure: What Jesus said about sin, mistakes and messing stuff up (SPCK) by Bishop Emma Ineson. There will be free online support for groups studying the book, including in-depth video interviews with the Archbishop of Canterbury and others exploring the themes of each of the chapters.

United Parish Communion continues on every third Sunday. These will rotate around each church in turn, at the normal time for that church's morning service: 19th February, 9am-St Giles, 19th March, 10.30am-St Luke's

World Day of Prayer Friday 3rd March "I Have Heard About Your Faith"

World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The service this year has been



prepared by the women of Taiwan, the main island in an archipelago of about 100 small islands off the south east coast of mainland China. It is the second most densely populated country in the world with a population of just under 24 million people.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 120 countries. It begins in Samoa, then prayer in many languages travels throughout the world, through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later.

The Cambridge Service: Friday 3rd March at Downing Place URC in Downing Street at 10.30 am

This year there will be just one service in Cambridge which will give us the opportunity to worship with church members from all over the city, followed by some refreshments. The service will be led by Rev'd Deborah McVey, who will from next year be the City organiser for WDP.

There is no parking at the church, the nearest car park being Grand Arcade. The church is very close to the central bus station. Buses 1, 8 5, 6 from our area all stop close by. If anyone has a blue badge then there is parking in Downing Place, a small road beside the church.

UPHOLDING CREATION - NEWS & IDEAS


As we all strive to live more lightly on the earth for the sake of all creation and future generations, there is a bewildering amount of advice and information now coming at us from all quarters. In this monthly section we will highlight actions and opportunities in

The Little Steps

Make Do and Mend - now where have we heard that before? This slogan and government campaign came about when clothes rationing was introduced during the Second World War. The population was encouraged to do whatever they could to extend the life of their clothes and then all household items. Although the terms 'reduce, reuse, recycle' were not used, that became the ethos of the times.

Now, eighty years later, there are equally good and urgent reasons to get your broken stuff mended rather



than throwing it out and buying new stuff. The Repair Cafes that are running locally during 2023 are places where skilled 'menders' will try to repair your broken items for a very small amount or sometimes for nothing. There are three running nearby in February alone, in Burwell, Great Shelford and at East Barnwell Community Centre, with seven up to the end of April. Full details of how to book a slot are online:

OUR HOME: UKRAINE An Art Exhibition in support of Ukraine

18-25th of February in The Old School at St Luke's (Special event on the 24th of February) Organised by OurHome Gallery and St Luke's Church, Cambridge

The contemporary anti-war art exhibition **OUR HOME**: **UKRAINE** presents works by 14 artists from Ukraine and their supporters. Ukraine is a country once known for its rich sunflower fields, beetroot borscht, Cossacks and the incredible Dnieper River. But with the onset of the Russian aggression in 2014 and a full-scale invasion in February 2022, Ukraine is known for war, for the suffering and the hardships associated with it, and for the selfless defence of its freedom and right to exist peacefully.

Explore different states of mind and feelings during the exhibition from the 18th to the 25th of February at St Luke's Church, Cambridge. Some artists created these artworks in bomb shelters under constant bombardment; on the road to escape and in different locations of exile; safe but in fear for their loved ones, fighting back as they best can. The paintings, like their creators, have come a long way to get to the UK, just like any refugee: days on the road along ruined and mined roads, under the constant threat of shelling, hours-long lines at the borders, through foreign countries and straight to our exhibition.

Half of the price of the painting will go to the author or authors of the work, the other half will be donated to a Ukrainian charity.

Join us for the special event on the 24th of February dedicated to the one-year anniversary of the invasion and during the whole duration of the exhibition.

He is fundraising for children's projects in the Gaza Strip: Never Stop Dreaming children centre in Khan Younis; Qayis centre for psychological support for children in Kuza'a and New Horizons in Nussairat refugee camp. The event is free, with an opportunity to donate.





Blue Plaque for Cecilia Payne: Isabella Mead

I first saw it at dusk, facing the moon: a roundel, the royal blue of winter mist, the white letters cut like patterns in ice to mirror the Earth, or a twilit Space.

Holst himself urged her to study music, join him in the balletic sweep of the planets, the grandiosity of love and war and magic but in very essence too blue and passive.

She preferred not planets but the stars, studied the sun with strident attention, measured its steadfast golden precession towards an explosive vibrant summation

of hydrogen and helium and blinding light. What marker for a thesis that surpassed the stars? These days I've taken to timing my run to pass her plaque at exactly midday,

see it shining and shadowless, almost gold in a full stream of sunlight, and the words appearing and disappearing by turns; by turns again, illuminating and erasing her name.

Cecilia Payne (1900–1979) was an astrophysicist whose ground-breaking 1925 thesis concluded that the sun and stars were mainly made of hydrogen and helium. Cambridge did not award her a degree due to being a woman, and Harvard did not allow her to become a professor for many years for the same reason. Even today, male contemporaries are credited for her work.
