Andrew and Lucinda have kindly shared some biographical information below as a preliminary to you meeting them soon.



The Rev'd Andrew Day

Andrew is currently, and remains, the Vicar of St Clement's, Cambridge. Born and educated in South Africa, Andrew came to the United Kingdom in 1989, and took up a post as a teacher in an independent school, ending that part of his career as a Housemaster, before embarking on an exciting stint in the travel industry. After some success, he returned to education in senior leadership in education, first as a deputy headteacher in the West London, then as a

principal of an academy in south-east London. He then moved north, following in his wife's wake, to the north-east of England to become the executive director of a Church of England academy. He trained for the priesthood at Lindisfarne College of Theology and was ordained deacon at Great St Mary's Cambridge in 2018, and priested in Ely Cathedral in 2019. He served his curacy at GSM before heading to St Clement's, Cambridge as priest-in-charge, becoming vicar a year later. Andrew is also an Assistant Diocesan Director of Ordinands and a Bishop's Advisor in the discernment process. He serves on the Ely Diocese Education Committee. He is married to Yvette, who is the Head of King's College School. His homely creatures include a beautiful German Short-haired Pointer, Grace, and an adventurous, marmalade cat, Odysseus.

The Rev'd Lucinda Howard

Lucinda has recently completed her curacy training at St Andrew's church Stapleford (appointed 2022) where she was also a Ridley Hall ordinand. Lucinda spent her childhood in Northamptonshire, growing up with her four sisters in a village very near to Althorp House and attending the local schools. She worked in various fields after graduating in American Studies from Nottingham University, including advertising sales at the Daily Record newspaper and account manager at Tennents Brewery during her time living in the city of Glasgow. She returned south in 2002 to complete a PGCE in Primary Education at Homerton College Cambridge, followed by a teaching post at William Wesley Primary School, Whittlesford and has remained happily living in the city, just off Mill Road, ever since. She met and married Gavin soon after arriving here, who chairs and runs local Christian charities as well being involved in the family business. She left teaching to raise her family, Samuel (20) and Hope (17). The family also have a lively Jack Russell Terrier Cross called Calvin, after the cartoon Calvin and Hobbes, not the pants designer or the Protestant reformer!

As befits December, there has been a lot of singing, joyous talking and eating at St Augustine's! The 'Community Come and Sing' event, led by Anne Taylor, brought in people of all ages from the neighbouring streets to sing international carols, and was followed by our Carol Service led by the St Augustine's Singers with mulled wine and mince pies.

The Cafe@99 (organized by the Richmond Road Residents Association) continues to meet on Mondays and Fridays with a now regular clientele as well as people who stop by occasionally to sit and chat. The Sunday Lunch Club celebrated its 50th anniversary in November (doesn't seem possible?!) and this month welcomed some fifty-five guests to its two course meal with wine/fruit juice and coffee. We explained that we are having to put up the price from £8 to £10 next year, but happily this seemed to be accepted.

We had a wonderful talk this month from Caroline Mead ('Pipes, Poos and Plagues') about what Cambridge was like before sewers and health regulations, and how we can see some of the varied heritage of the 19th century as we wander about the city. Next year's programme of Friday Night Talks will be published early in January.

In the New Year we shall be celebrating (standing room only last New Year's Day) with Gilbert and Sullivan's 'Iolanthe' from the Cambridgeshire Light Opera Group, with members of St Augustine's Singers, and Canterbury Brass, directed by Lucas Elkin with Philip Mead.


As we finish the year, we have more than twenty community groups coming to share the space of the church, making music and art, doing crafts, keeping fit and learning. A good basis to build on in 2026!

ST GILES' NEWS

St Giles' Christmas Fair on 13 December was well attended, drawing in visitors with its offer of Christmas crafts and stalls, light lunches and

tasty teas and some most enjoyable music from Castle Hill Band, who turned up in such numbers that they all only just managed to squeeze in. Many thanks to them and to the organisers who worked so hard to provide the food and convivial atmosphere.



A Visit to the Stained Glass Restoration Workshop

In November, St Giles organised a trip to Great Moulton in Norfolk to visit the workshop where our stained-glass windows are being restored. Terry Devlin, who is in charge of the work, gave us a fascinating tour and showed us the windows at various stages of restoration.

If you have walked past St Giles recently and noticed the wooden boards where the windows once were, you may have wondered how such delicate works of art could be removed safely. In fact, stained-glass windows are surprisingly robust. Terry demonstrated this by lifting one of the windows: although badly buckled and visibly flexing, it still held together. He also showed us his hands after handling the glass — years of soot and candle grime had turned them black, giving a vivid sense of how much cleaning is required.

The restoration process begins not with dismantling, but with careful documentation. Each window is photographed and a full-size rubbing is made to record exactly how all the pieces fit together. Only then is the old lead removed and the individual pieces of glass cleaned. Where possible, any cracks or breaks are repaired using specialist glues.

At this stage, the character of the glass becomes especially clear. We could see how uneven the thickness of the glass is, and how decoration is often applied to different sides — something that is hard to appreciate once the windows are back in place. Terry also showed us examples of different decorative techniques. One panel, detailing a name, was made from flashed glass: clear glass with a thin layer of red glass on top. Parts of the red layer had been etched away to form the letters, while silver-stain painted on the back gave the clear glass a yellow tone, making the letters appear yellow on a red background. On the front, opaque paint had been carefully applied to outline the lettering.

Terry described our windows as being of excellent quality — “Waitrose quality,” as he put it. We saw one window that had already been cleaned, and even to untrained eyes the increase in brightness and clarity was striking. New lead cames [grooved lead strips used to hold together sections of glass] were being prepared, and the studio is able to mill these in-house, which is especially useful given the variations in glass thickness. Once the glass is re-leaded, the joints are soldered and a linseed-oil-based paste is worked into the window to waterproof it on both sides. After cleaning off the excess paste, the window is ready to return to St Giles.

Working with lead does, of course, require special precautions. The studio is fitted with extraction units, whose filters are cleaned monthly, and the restorers wear overalls and shoes that remain on site and are laundered there.

It was a fascinating and very informative trip, and it may be possible to arrange a second visit this new year, when the studio will be working on the rest of the windows. We are hoping that the restored windows will be returned and reinstalled in St Giles early in the new year, and we very much look forward to seeing them back in place.



A Recommended Read

God, the Science, the Evidence – The Dawn of a Revolution



Two Frenchmen, Michel-Yves Bolloré and Olivier Bonnassies, have published a book intended to show that there need be no conflict between science and faith. Cosmologies have demonstrated conclusively that the dawn of creation, over 13 billion years ago, accompanied such a degree of fine tuning that the work of a creator can be detected in all that exists.

Their work draws on the expertise of scientists in many fields, and is accompanied by extensive quotations from the investigators, many of them

Nobel prize winners, who admitted that their researches have revealed something of the hand of the creator. Many are left with wonder at what they have discovered. Whilst quoting the latest findings, the book is written in a style which is easy to follow, and difficult to put down.

It was originally published four years ago in French. Translation has taken a long time, I imagine because much of the research must have been done in English and tracking down the original quotations in what was often the original language of publication would require a lot of effort. The English edition was given a launch in Cambridge by the Faraday Society, which is dedicated to issues of faith and science.

The book is both a gripping read and astonishing bargain – nearly 600 pages, many in full colour, published at £22 but available on line at well below £20.

A hot, two course supper will be served, with soft drinks and a vegetarian option. You may bring your own alcoholic drinks if you wish. The cost of




