ARCHIVE OF EVERYDAY LIFE, THOUGHT AND FEELING**

Founded in 1937, with roots in anthropology, sociology and documentary film, Mass Observation sought to document people's everyday lives. From wartime morale, religion and politics, to dreams and happiness, it captured behaviours, thoughts and feelings, using unique research methods. The archive, kept at the University of Sussex, is vast and offers a fascinating and valuable insight into Britain's social history. **Kirsty Patrick**, Mass Observation's Research Manager, will share insights to the collections and its work today as a national charity supporting research, teaching and learning.
